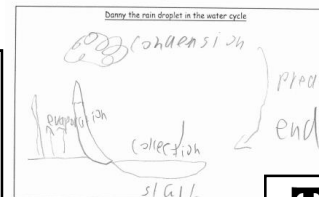
#### Health and social care extension

Danny starts his life out as a tiny water droplet in a lake, river or the sea. He then is evaporated by the sun into the sky where he cools down and turns into clouds. For some time he stays as a cloud until the wind begins to blow. As the wind blows him across the sky he turns into precipitation this means he can be either rain, sleet or snow. One he has fallen to the ground he finds his way back to the lake, river or sea again. He does this by either running downhill along the soil: this is called surface run-off. Or he can go deep underground as ground water, however this takes much longer.
