





DIFFERENT LEVELS?



They generally fall into one of three categories:

- Intermediate Level Apprenticeships
 - Advanced Level Apprenticeships
 - Higher Apprenticeships

Intermediate Apprenticeship

- •Level 2
- •12-18 months
- •Equivalent to 5 GCSE passes.

Advanced Apprenticeship

- •Level 3
- •18-48 months
- •Equivalent to 2 A-level passes.

Higher Apprenticeship

- •Levels 4,5,6,7
- •24 months+
- •Equivalent to foundation degree level+

Vocational courses

- Many schools offer a range of vocational courses like <u>BTECs</u> and <u>OCR Cambridge</u> qualifications to post 16 students and many more are available in colleges. By applying learning to real-life situations, these qualifications offer a more practical approach than more traditional A Level academic courses.
- **Vocational subjects** related to a broad employment area such as business, engineering, IT, health and social care. Previously called BTECs and OCR Cambridge Nationals, if they are at Level 3 these are now called **Applied Vocational Qualifications**.
- Vocational courses that lead to specific jobs such as
 hairdressing, accounting, professional cookery or plumbing. These
 courses are called <u>Tech Levels</u> (if they are at Level 3) and are
 offered mostly at colleges.





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


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I. Quizzing




Putting information into short answer questions and answers is useful as you are doing something with the information and also can use the tests to get friends/parents to test you again at a later date. If you put the question on one side of paper or flashcard and the answer on the back then you can test yourself. Multiple choice questions are even better as you have to think about other options which leads to greater understanding.

2. Flashcards



Flashcards provide quick reference of material and force you to summarise information into an easy format. Key words and themes can be highlighted and they can be used for quick recall and repetition. They can be used to write up quizzes or plan our answers to common exam questions. They can also be used right up until the minute before the exam as they are easy to carry with you anywhere.

3. Graphic Organisers



There are lots of different templates you can use. The tricky bit will be deciding which one is best! Graphic organisers are a great way of helping you to pull out the most important information and prepare for more complicated exam questions. For example, you might note down causes and effects of something in preparation for an 'Explain why...' or 'Explain the consequences...' type question. This is incredibly effective if targeting the higher grades. You can create your own or use the many templates available to you.

4. Round the Clock Revision




These are genius! You need to break a bigger topic down into 12 themes or sections. Take each section and spend 5 minutes on each part of the clock. Before you know it you have done an hour's revision without even thinking about it...well much! To make these even special, you can highlight themes across the clock or include images to help create memory pags for recall. This strategy is useful as it makes you commit to an hour at a time and you can see the results at the end of the revision session.



5. Cornell Method

This is a very simple technique for organising your revision notes. It takes no set up! You need a piece of A4 paper and a pen! You need to divide your page into three sections as shown here.



6. Past Paper Questions



This is the most effective use of revision time and should be a key feature of your study sessions. Using past papers helps you identify question types that are used so you can then theme your revision using some of the other strategies. Also, planning out and learning example answers will help you when you get into the exam hall. This is particularly the case where there are extended answers. Please see your teachers for a bank of exam papers or questions that you can use.

7. Mind Maps



These are a simple way to organise revision notes. They are used to help summarise key points and the nature of the design, leads you to categorise information into themes. This is good for active revision. The best mind maps are on plain paper, landscape and have some visual hooks or colour to help key ideas stick!

8. Mnemonics, Acronyms and Rhymes



This is useful as a hook for memorising key facts for shorter recall exam questions.

Mnemonics	Richard Of York Gave Battle in Vain (colours of the rainbow)
Acronyms	Words that are created by the first letter of a word e.g. SMART targets: HWA (Hanham Woods Academy)
Rhymes	Creating lyrics to a song or a poem about the topic you are revising. This has 'stick power' as it is simple to remember.



9. Washing Lines



This is a great technique for helping to reorganise information. If you put information into themes on separate cards or paper, then you can set yourself different exam style questions about the content and you can then resort the information to help you answer that question. For example, organising in order of importance for an argument or balancing points on two sides of an argument.

II. Podcasting



Recording pieces of key information can be helpful if you are on the move or have a week where you will be out of the house a lot and want to use the study time you have wisely. All you need is a method of recording yourself (e.g phone). Alternatively, audacity is a piece of free software you can use to do this using a laptop or computer. Then you can take your revision anywhere with you at any time!

Post-it notes



Free up some space in your study area to put up revision posters showing the key content you have studied (summarised or categorised). This is then available for quick reference and can be checked at any point. Using post it notes can make this even more effective. For example, you could have questions on them about the content underneath so you could test yourself. Alternatively, different colour posit its can highlight key themes across the information.

I2. Memory Pegs



To improve your memory, hang what you need to know on mental image pegs. Mental pegs are memory aids (visual) which help you to find information in your memory and recall it. This is really useful for needing to remember sequences, parts of a story, parts of an essay or key words and terminology. It can make the job of memorising lists much more manageable.
